This summer, I participated in the Kobe University UNESCO Chair Summer Program which was held in Gajah Mada University, Indonesia from September 9 th to 21 st . I learned a lot from this experience and the precious memories of that time I will keep in my mind throughout my life.
This project is undertaken by Kobe University in cooperation with UNESCO and partner institutions, in hopes of realizing a new standard of disaster risk reduction, and building an international disaster risk reduction network. The subject of this year is “Gender and Vulnerability in Disaster Risk Reduction Support”. The students from Kobe University, Gajah Mada University and National Kaosiung University of Science and Technology discussed together and each team made a group presentation according to the subject in English.
Thanks to all the professors for giving us so many interesting and valuable lectures which broadened my knowledges on disaster management. Especially, I was deeply impressed by the lecture from Pro. Hafiz Amirrol, who is from Mercy Malaysia. From the lecture “Disaster Response and Response Preparedness in Asia and the Pacific” and the group activity, I learned the importance of communication and cooperation. When a disaster happens, timely and effective disaster response is critical to relief victims and recover the city. So, the coordination among national government, NGOs, NPOs, international assistance and private sectors are essential in the response phase.
From the field trip, I know more about disaster management for volcanic disaster. We visited Sleman District Management Centre, early warning system and evacuation shelters. We learned how they spread the evacuation information and how to evacuate residents. In addition, I understand the culture of Indonesia and the connection between the neighborhoods in Indonesia is very close. After interviewing a resident in Petung village. I was impressed by her positive attitude. Even though she suffered from the last volcanic eruption and still lives in the area with high disaster risk, she is satisfied with her life now, thanks to the support by the government. During the group discussion and presentation, I was surprised that all the students tried their best to express their thoughts and contribute their efforts to the group. Although,

sometimes there were some language barriers between us, we tried to explain and be patient to hear other people's opinions.

I really appreciate all the careful arrangements in these two weeks, but I would like to make a suggestion to this project. I feel that it would be better if all the field study could be contributed to the final group presentation. I think many students may have many comments and ideas after field visit, but they didn't have a chance to express them and discuss together. I hope there would be more time for discussing and sharing opinions.

I feel that it is a great opportunity for me to study and discuss with my fellow members from around the world in disaster risk reduction issues from the viewpoint of gender and vulnerability. During this period, I can fully spark my thoughts and be inspired by my fellow members. I think this is an unforgettable experience and a real rewarding opportunity for my growth.
